# **JANUARY-APRIL 2022 PROJECT UPDATE**

School began on 3<sup>rd</sup> January after the school holidays. This is the day we opened our school for the 3<sup>rd</sup> term of the academic year.

We had several activities lined up for our implementation. Below are some of the activities we did during the period of January through April.

#### a) Auditing

Auditing is a government requirement for all organizations in Kenya. Non-Governmental Organization must present their audited report to the *Ministry of Interior and National Coordination* by 30<sup>th</sup> March every year.

We started our auditing in early January. By the beginning of February, we had submitted our auditing report to the NGO Board.

#### b) Construction

We received a donation from the Podschlapp family in Germany for the construction of a computer workshop. We started this construction in January and by the end of April, it was completed. The Podschlapp family visited in February to see the progress of this construction. They were very happy with the progress. They planned to support the project with computers and furniture, which they did when Mr. Podschlapp celebrated his birthday.

## c) Covid-19 Vaccination

Covid-19 pandemic affected a lot of operation both in Kenya and the rest of the world. Some of our staff and children were affected between 2020 and 2022.

We brought in Ministry of Health officers to vaccinate staff and parents last year (2021). This year, we brought them to vaccinate children between 15-17 years.

## d) Micro-Credits

We have about 40 parents who are in active micro- businesses. Most of them received startup funding from their children's sponsors while others received through fundraising from Alexandra Merz, Renate Oberdiek and Kathrin Beier, who are all dedicated sponsors from Germany. We really appreciate their efforts.

In February 2022 we visited all of the parents who received micro-credits. Most of them are keeping chickens. Others run food, charcoal, and used clothing kiosks among others.

Most businesses are doing well, and parents are able to earn for their basic needs through these businesses. They are very grateful for the support they have received from LLK and sponsors.

#### e) Well Drilling

In early March, we received a donation of about 3,000,000 Kenya shillings from a company in Germany (Hunter) towards the construction of a water well at our school. About 2.3m went towards the borehole while about 700,000 Kenya shillings went towards solar installation. This water project has solved our perennial problem we have been having since 2014. We have been buying 2 lorries of water every week.

It was Renate Angermann's (deceased) dream for us to have enough water in our school. Before passing on a couple of years back, she had donated several water tanks for rain harvesting. May God continue resting her in eternal peace.

Through the efforts of Renate Oberdiek, Maike Diekmann, Jörg Kleinberg and many others from Germany, the company **HUNTER** in Germany donated the funds for the construction and installation of a well. We are also very grateful to Nadine Trautwein, the head of the **HUNTER** company for this donation. Through the tireless fundraising efforts of Renate Oberdiek and Maike Diekmann, the costs of the solar power panels for the water pump were completely paid for.

This project was awarded to a well drilling company called *Fountain Vent Ltd*. It took them 3 weeks to complete the work. This project was officially launched by Brique Zeiner, the LLK chairperson on 16<sup>th</sup> April. This has solved all our water problems. We are very grateful to all who made this possible.

#### f) Grade 8 exam results

In the 2021 academic year 49 LLK children who sat for their grade 8 final exams. 19 children were attending our partner schools and 30 children were from our school (**Live and Learn in Kenya Primary School**). Out of them 40 passed very well with at least 250 marks out of the possible 500. 9 were below average.

In our school all the 30 children passed very high marks. One child received 317 marks out of the possible 500. Abdul Razak was the best student with 397 marks. 5 of our children were admitted to national schools — which is the highest form of high school in Kenya, while 30 were admitted to extern county high schools. Only 5 were admitted in county high schools.

I thank all teachers, parents and children for the hard work and cooperation that enabled this fabulous performance. I also thank our sponsors who have donated school fees and other learning requirements that enabled all of these children to join high school.

When results were announced by the minister of education, there were celebrations all over the streets. Parents joined pupils and staff to celebrate good results on the streets of Nakuru.

They came with an abundance of presents for both children and staff. On their arrival in Nakuru they organized a special party for all staff. On 11<sup>th</sup> April they were welcomed to our center by children, staff and parents.

While in Nakuru, they carried out several activities. They visited sponsored children and their families and micro-credit projects, they helped with cooking and serving the children's lunches, and finally they officially dedicated 3 constructions that we had built. (Kindergarten block, Administration block and vocational block). They also unveiled the newly built well.

We also received a book donation from **Second Life Residents** through Brique Zeiner. These books were worth 121,000 Kenya shillings. On behalf of our children, I was very grateful. These books will boost reading of our children especially literature.
